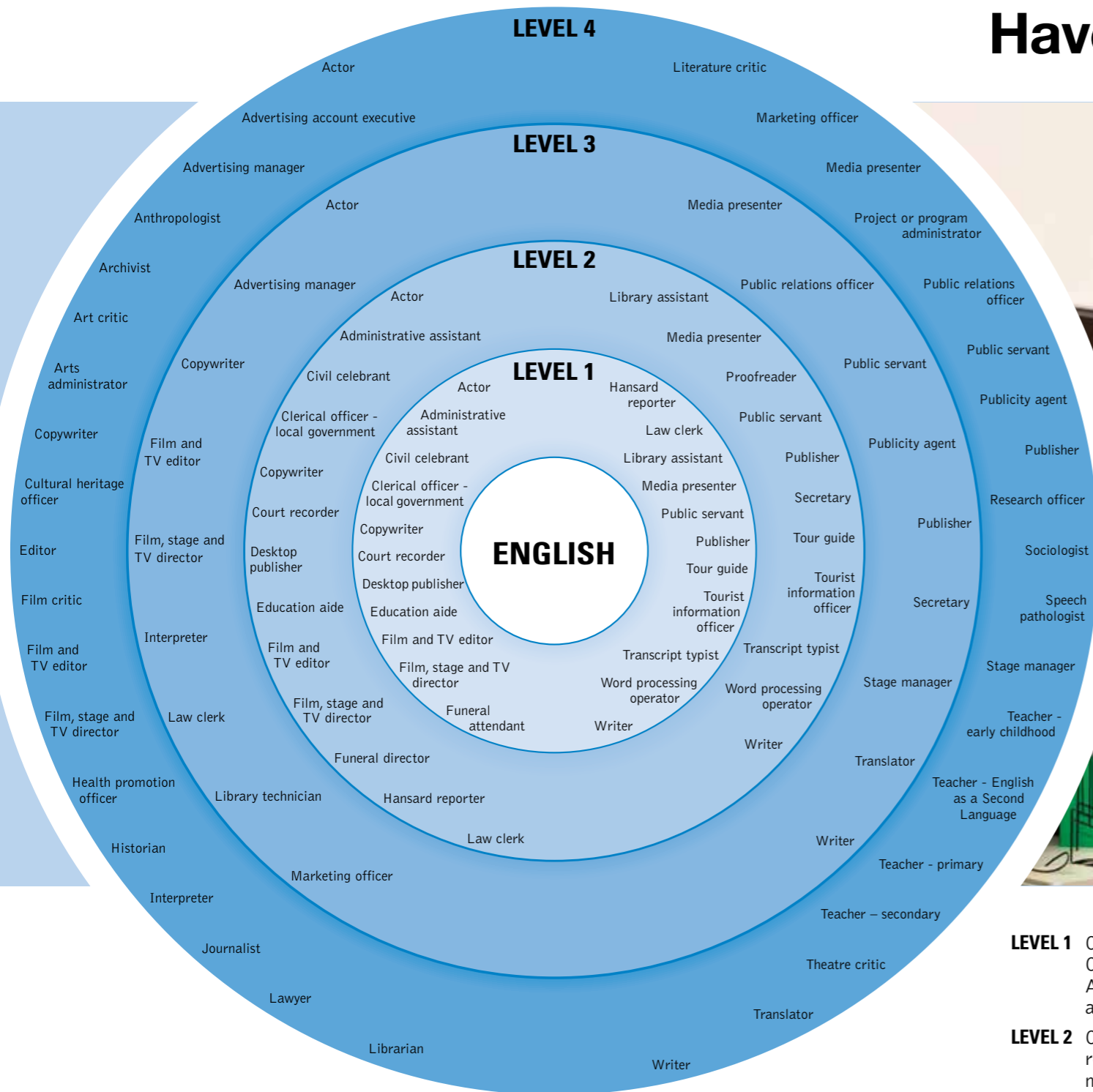


Do you enjoy or are you good at ENGLISH?

SERENE - Legal secretary

When I finished school I went straight into a job as a legal secretary. All of my training was gained on the job, through practical experience. I originally started an engineering degree at university, thinking this would be a safe career choice. However, after a semester I was struggling. At school I'd always liked English, and preferred assignments where I could discuss my ideas in an essay, rather than having to calculate the one correct answer, so I switched to a Bachelor of Arts, majoring in English and Media Studies. I'm now working as a research officer and editor on a national publication. Needless to say, I'm thankful I listened to my heart and changed courses.

LEVEL 1 Completion of Year 10, Senior Secondary Certificate of Education, Certificate I or II. Australian Apprenticeships may be offered at this level.

LEVEL 2 Certificate III or IV or at least three years relevant experience. Australian Apprenticeships may be offered at this level.

LEVEL 3 Diploma or Advanced Diploma. Study is often undertaken through TAFEs or Registered Training Organisations. Some universities offer studies at this level.

LEVEL 4 Usually requires the completion of a Bachelor Degree or higher qualification. Study is often undertaken at university.
